

U.S. FISH AND WILDLIFE SERVICE SPORT HUNTING PERMIT PROGRESS UPDATE

- The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's (USFWS) International Affairs Program issues an average of **20,000 permits** per year under the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora (CITES), the Endangered Species Act (ESA), and other laws protecting at-risk species of plants and animals.
- Permits support legal, traceable, and biologically-sustainable trade and combat wildlife trafficking by 1) ensuring the legal and biologically-sustainable use of regulated species, 2) documenting legal trade, and 3) discerning legally-traded wildlife from illegally-traded wildlife.
- We take a conservation risk-approach to making biologically-sustainable use determinations and prioritize based on conservation impact.

HUNTING STAKEHOLDERS: CONSERVATION IMPACT

- Well-managed & scientifically-based hunting programs can be valuable conservation tools for wildlife populations.
- The USFWS issues trophy import permits under the authority of the United States Endangered Species Act (ESA).
- We have developed a process to document how the import of legal, biologically-sustainable hunting trophies is enhancing the survival of the species in the wild.

Our permitting program supports the U.S. international wildlife trade, valued at over **\$1 billion** annually.
